

Despite some last-minute visa problems, and the concern over SARS, the inbound Group Study Exchange team from India is now enjoying their time in District 7090.

This exchange marks the return visit from District 3060, with the outbound team having experienced the hospitality of a visit to India earlier this year.

The members of the inbound team include:

- Naresh Gandhi, a Rotarian since 1984, a mechanical engineer who is managing director of Datta Chemicals;
- Noel Britto, a doctor who works as a consultant anesthesiologist and intensivist;

- Mayur Jhala, an associate research scientist in the department of microbiology at the Veterinary College in Anand;
- Hiral Dholakia, a feature writer and copy editor for The Times of India;
- Vishakha Dave, an executive for Tech-Pacific India, where she is involved in marketing.

The GSE program began in 1955 as an idea from a district in New Zealand. Originally known as the Rotary Overseas Travel Award, the program was officially adopted by RI in 1965, and since that time, more than 9,000 teams with almost 50,000 participants have been involved in the initiative.

The annual District Conference is now history. There were about 390 people in attendance at the Conference and they were treated to wonderful programs, speakers and fun.






